What Matters To You

We have listened to you and the concerns you raised and prioritised the following going forward from July to September 2025:

Priority 1: Theft of Motor Vehicles

You said: Theft of motor vehicles, primarily motorised pedal cycles, mopeds and motorbikes is an issue across the beat.

What we are going to do: We will complete patrols in public car parks and key locations where mopeds/motorbikes are regularly parked. We will liaise with business owners, community groups and social media to raise awareness and knowledge around security. We will hold beat events to be more accessible to your concerns or issues. The team will assist with ongoing investigations from all teams to help identify offenders and bring them to justice.

Priority 2: Anti-social behaviour

You Said: Anti-social behaviour has increased around the beat, specifically involving juveniles and open spaces.

What we are going to do: We will increase patrols in ASB hotspots as well as using data to pick out the appropriate times to be there. We will liaise with partner agencies and use an incremental approach to those causing the most harm. Police engagements will be arranged to increase awareness and be in a position to offer support to those being affected.

Priority 3: Safer Streets Summer

You said: Retail and street crime is an ongoing issue in your area as well as the surrounding areas.

What we are going to do: We will take part in the national campaign of Safer Streets Summer. This will increase visibility of officers, increase engagements with local businesses and community groups and help tackle issues relating to retail and street crime by having a team dedicated to it. This will also include student safety when the university students start their academic year and take part in freshers weeks.

As part of his role as the Leicester Royal Infirmary (LRI) liaison officer, PC Culverwell continues to build strong relationships with hospital staff through regular engagement events. These sessions aim to enhance staff understanding of police procedures, the requirements for effective investigations, and provide valuable input on mental health matters relevant to clinical teams. He works closely with the hospital's security teams, reviewing incidents and supporting live operations to ensure a coordinated response. His ongoing presence at the LRI not only reinforces our commitment to partnership working but also boosts confidence in our team and provides a reassuring, visible police presence within the hospital environment.

Over the last quarter, the beat team actively supported the national Operation Sceptre campaign, which focuses on tackling knife crime and raising awareness around its impact on communities. As part of this initiative, we partnered with the Violence Intervention Project to host a series of engagement events. These provided valuable opportunities to connect with members of the public, share information, and listen to their concerns. In addition to community engagement, the team carried out targeted operations against individuals linked to knife-related offences. We also conducted knife sweeps in public areas to locate and safely dispose of any discarded weapons, helping to make our streets safer for everyone.



Tackling anti-social behaviour (ASB) in open spaces remained a key priority for our beat team last quarter—and continues to be a focus moving forward. We identified and regularly patrolled hotspot areas, engaging with members of the public to provide reassurance and gather community feedback. Our efforts included a range of proactive measures, from investigating reports of drug use and stone throwing to addressing issues related to car meets and unlicensed street parties. Where appropriate, we applied an incremental approach to dealing with perpetrators, ensuring that interventions were proportionate and supported by thorough investigations.

Over the past three months, the beat team has been actively engaging with both local businesses and the wider public through a variety of initiatives. These included bike register events held at Newark House Museum and Leicester Royal Infirmary (LRI), residential consultations focused on anti-social behaviour hotspots, and high-visibility patrols in open spaces. We also had a strong presence at the annual Riverside Festival, which once again ran smoothly and was a fantastic day enjoyed by all who attended. These engagements continue to strengthen our connection with the community and reinforce our commitment to proactive, visible policing.
