| ASB (Anti-Social Behaviour) – Ongoing issues with large groups of youths, particularly on public parks, fighting, playing loud music, being abusive, drinking and using drugs. | Officers are regularly patrolling areas which have been highlighted as areas of concern. We are also looking to identify those causing issues in the area. |
| Drugs – Reports of drug dealing and using at several addresses on the beat, attracting undesirables to the location and often resulting in ASB (Anti-Social Behaviour) and disorder at the addresses. | Intelligence has been received in relation to properties on the beat using drugs. The intelligence is being developed and we will work closely with the local authority and housing providers. |
| Road Safety – Speeding of vehicles along several roads on the beat, breaches of weight restrictions and bridge strikes all lead to a feeling amongst the community that road safety is an issue. | See below for full details |

News

The NH26 Neighbourhood Beat team have been conducting joint agency patrols, with colleagues from HBBC and LFRS especially around the local Schools. We recently targeted Battling Brook Community Primary School due to continued complaints from residents, parents and teachers. Reports of vehicles parking on pavements, along double yellow lines, close to junctions along Outlands Drive, Seaforth Drive, Frederick Avenue and Henry St. The majority of vehicle users were very understanding when advised, moving their vehicles when asked. Here's a quick reminder of what the rules say, (alternative rules may apply to disabled badge holders):



Double Yellow Lines - You must not park or wait on double yellow lines at any time — this applies 24/7. This includes the pavement right next to them, as obstruction is still an offence.

Pavement Parking - Local councils can ban pavement parking using local regulations. Where restrictions are in place, a Penalty Charge Notice may be issued. Even where not banned, vehicles blocking pavements can still be dealt with if they cause an obstruction, especially to wheelchair users, pushchairs and those with visual impairments.

Parking Near a Junction - The Highway Code says you should not park within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, as it creates dangerous blind spots and makes it harder for vehicles to turn safely.

Near Schools - Stopping or parking on school entrance markings when restrictions are in place is not allowed. These rules help protect children at busy drop-off and pick-up times.

Why This Matters - Parking on pavements or too close to junctions forces pedestrians into the road and blocks visibility for drivers — increasing the risk of collisions. Your cooperation genuinely helps keep children and other road users safe. If you're unsure whether you should park somewhere, please choose a safer spot a little further away.

During the day we also made time to speak with parents and children, who really enjoyed meeting the team. Further patrols are being put in place to cover other local schools of note.
