You said - We did

- Speeding (34 votes on Neighbourhood Link (NHL)) . Between 01/04/2026 and 30/04/2026 the mobile speed camera visited the A47 six times, A6003 once, and B6047 five times. In total thirty one offences were detected.
- Anti social behaviour (21 votes on NHL) - identifying individuals causing the anti social behaviour. Passing their names to the council to start the incremental approach. Targeting areas of known ASB activity.
- Nuisance motorbikes (19 votes on NHL) - We have been conducting uniformed and marked vehicle patrols in the areas you have told us this is a problem. We have directed officers to these areas in any down time they have to deter these offenders from causing problems in these areas.

WATER SAFETY CODE

Stop and Think, Spot the Dangers
If you are thinking of being near or entering the water, have you considered the following?

- Be aware of cold water shock**
For more info visit www.watersafetycotland.org.uk/coldwatershock
- Keep off all frozen waters**
- Check for safety signage**
- Avoid alcohol and drugs**
- The depth of the water may hide underwater ledges, hidden currents and unseen items**
- Be aware of other water activities**
- If it is safe to enter the water, ensure you have a safe way out**
- At the coast, consider rip currents, wind and the tide**

Stay Together, Stay Close
It is better to go over the water with a friend or family member

If you are in trouble in the water, float until you feel calm
Lean back, extend your arms and legs

Float until you can control your breathing. Then call for help or swim to safety

In an Emergency, Call 999

If you see someone in trouble DO NOT enter the water

Look for a throw line or life ring to help whilst you wait on the emergency services

Call 999 or 112 For inland waters ask for the Fire and Rescue Service. For coastal waters ask for the Coastguard

This month has seen summer arrive early with record breaking hot temperatures. The local neighbourhood team has seen an increase in reports of people swimming in bodies of open water. They want to remind people that cold water shock can be deadly, even in warm weather.

Incidents of trespassing and swimming in ponds and lakes have been reported in Saddington reservoir.

Officers have also received calls from people who have raised concerns about the welfare of animals during the high temperatures.

We are urging owners to make sure their pets and livestock have access to water and shade during the hot weather.



This month, we received a number of calls over a few days of a suspicious male in Fleckney. It came to a head when officers were called to the village and attended a male who had threatened a young female with a weapon. The male was arrested for a public order offence which we call an affray. He was interviewed and released with bail conditions to prevent further offending. Due to the behaviour of the subject a number of Police resources were required to bring the arrest to a safe conclusion.
