What matters to you

We have listened to you and the concerns you raised and prioritised the following:

Priority 1: Rural Crime (Including burglary)

You said: Rural Crime is a priority with a high emphasis on burglaries and thefts from vans and cars.

Priority 2: Road Safety

You Said: Road Safety continues to be an issue particularly speeding in the rural areas and through busy villages and obstruction caused by parking.

Priority 3: Antisocial Behavior

You said: Anti-social behavior was a priority.

You Said

We have continued to see an increase in targeted motorbike thefts in our area this month, as well as an increase in the quantity of reported burglaries.

In addition, officers have continued to receive reports relating to concerns around speeding across the beat area as well as vehicle parking outside of school premises.

We Did

The beat team continue to conduct proactive patrols with both marked and unmarked vehicles in our rural areas and specifically those that have been most affected by reported burglaries.

Anti-social Behaviour: Officers have attended the village area of Ratby this month due to reports of groups of youths causing Anti-Social Behavior in specific locations. Officers have successfully identified those involved in these incidents and as a result they will be dealt with via the incremental approach system in partnership with the Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council Anti-Social Behaviour Team.

In addition, to assist in the prevention of further issues, the beat team have organised patrols with both marked and unmarked vehicles at key days/times.

What we have done #yousaidwedid



Schools are open once again and we have started to receive residents' complaints about inconsiderate parking outside of the schools. Consequently, the beat team have arranged some specific actions regarding the issue. Please find below some useful information and advice:

Pick-up and drop-off times are busy outside schools. This can cause an increased safety risk to both children and parents. Parking restrictions outside schools are there to keep you and your children safe. Parking inconsiderately can put people in danger and you also risk being fined. It's important that motorists follow the Highway Code.

Yellow zigzag markings sometimes there may be an accompanying sign that shows specific times when these restrictions are in place. Motorists are legally allowed to park on the zigzags outside of these hours.

Both yellow and white zigzags also show areas that must be kept clear so that children and other road users can see clearly when crossing the road.

Parking on yellow zigzags

You can legally park on yellow zigzags under certain circumstances.

Yellow zigzags without accompanying signs advise motorists not to wait or park there at any time for the safety of children and others. We can and do issue tickets for parking on them, based on causing an obstruction to other motorists or pedestrians.

Some yellow zigzags have a single or double yellow line, which indicate different parking restrictions.
